Emmaus and Us: Scott Hahn Reflects on the Third Sunday of Easter

We should put ourselves in the shoes of the disciples in today's Gospel. Downcast and confused, they're making their way down the road, unable to understand all the things that have occurred. They know what they've seen a prophet mighty in word and deed. They know what they were hoping for that He would be the redeemer of Israel. But they don't know what to make of His violent death at the hands of their rulers. They can't even recognize Jesus as He draws near to walk with them. He seems like just another foreigner visiting Jerusalem for the Passover. Note that Jesus doesn't disclose His identity until they describe how they found His tomb empty but "Him they did not see." That's how it is with us, too. Unless He revealed himself we would see only an empty tomb and a meaningless death. How does Jesus make himself known at Emmaus? First, He interprets "all the Scriptures" as referring to Him. In today's First Reading and Epistle, Peter also opens the Scriptures to proclaim the meaning of Christ's death according to the Father's "set plan" foreknown before the foundation of the world. Jesus is described as a new Moses and a new Passover lamb. He is the One of whom David sang in today's Psalm whose soul was not abandoned to corruption but was shown the path of life. After opening the Scriptures, Jesus at table took bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to the disciples exactly what He did at the Last Supper (Lk 22:14-20). In every Eucharist, we reenact that Easter Sunday at Emmaus. Jesus reveals himself to us in our journey. He speaks to our hearts in the Scriptures. Then at the table of the altar, in the person of the priest, He breaks the bread. The disciples begged him, "Stay with us." So He does. Though He has vanished from our sight, in the Eucharist — as at Emmaus — we know Him in the breaking of the bread.

Don't become a victim
Learn to spot email designed
to steal your money and identity

The FBI reports that email scams and phishing attacks are on the rise.

It should no surprise that scammers are leveraging the COVID-19 pandemic as a means of attracting victims. Fraudsters have been leveraging the opportunity to collect personal and/or corporate info by sending emails to unsuspecting victims that may contain web links to nefarious websites or have attachments (such as PDF documents) embedded with malware. The documents or links may also ask for your email or network credentials to authenticate to your account. DON'T BE TRICKED INTO DIVULGING YOUR PASSWORD, ACCOUNT INFO, or PERSONAL INFORMATION. Victims have also been receiving emails from scammers who impersonate an individual or a corporate identity with whom you are familiar. The scammer uses a sense of urgency to lure the individual to immediately respond by email or smartphone texting. In some cases, the scammer is simply attempting to scam the victim out of money (like a gift card) or covertly collect personal and/or financial information for use at a later date. The scammer uses a familiar looking name with a phony email address and might even include a photograph. This past week, the Diocese has received multiple reports that texts and emails have been received from a scammer impersonating Bishop Soto and pastors of the Diocese. The scammer has most likely been cleverly collecting email addresses and mobile phone numbers from such things as parish bulletins and related websites. PLEASE CAREFULLY SCRUTINIZE THE ADDRESSES AND PHONE NUMBERS YOU RECEIVE EMAIL AND TEXTS FROM. If you are not absolutely certain the email or text request is authentic, try to respond to the individual in person or call the individual using a phone number you know is correct. If you have been scammed or compromised via the internet, you should file a complaint with the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center at <https://bec.ic3.gov>. Mass Intentions

Offering a Mass for a special intention is a long-standing tradition in the Catholic Church. Masses are offered for many reasons; for the souls in purgatory or in remembrance for someone who is deceased, or someone who is ill or having a special occasion.

A Mass Intention may be set for:

- 1) A deceased loved one
- 2) A living person who is sick or suffering, celebrating a birthday, anniversary or other special moment in their life;
- 3) In thanksgiving to God (including the Lord Jesus or the Holy Spirit);
- 4) In thanksgiving for a favor granted through the intercession of a Blessed or a Saint;
- 5) For a prayer intention (so long as the intention does not contradict Church teaching)



If you would like to have a Mass said for someone, contact the Parish Office with the dates and times that are available. Mass Intentions are published weekly in the Sunday bulletin. Mass Intentions are a personal donation, but the suggested amount is \$10. This signifies the sacrificial nature of giving of something of yourself to associate more intimately with Christ who offers himself in the Eucharist. We reserve the right to reschedule any intention request for a Mass that was already booked.
